Marsden Junior Schools Admissions Policy

Proposed Admission Arrangements for 2024-2025

ENTRY AT AGE 7

Great Heights Academy Trust has responsibility for admissions to Marsden Junior School and plans to offer **60 places (admission number) at age 7 in September 2024**. To apply for a place at Marsden Junior School ('the school'), an applicant must apply via the Kirklees coordinated admissions scheme using the on-line Parent Portal on the Kirklees website. It is very important that the application is made by the closing date because applications made after this date will be treated as "late". Late applications are not dealt with until all those received on time have been through the application process.

Oversubscription Criteria

Where the number of applicants for Marsden Junior School, received during the normal admissions round, exceeds the admission number of the school, the Academy will apply the following criteria in order of priority.

Priority 1

- a. looked after children and previously looked after children
- b. children who were previously in state care outside of England and ceased to be as a result of being adopted

Priority 2: Children who live in the school's Priority Admission Area (PAA) who have a brother or sister attending from the same address at the date of admission (the sibling rule)

Priority 3: Children who live in the school's Priority Admission Area (PAA)

Priority 4: Children who live outside the schools Priority Admission Area (PAA) who have a brother or sister attending from the same address at the date of admission (the sibling rule)

Priority 5: Children who live outside the school's Priority Admission Area (PAA)

The Academy will admit children with statements of special educational needs where the school is named on the statement or Education, Health Care Plan (EHCP).

If the requests for admission in the Oversubscription Criteria 2) to 5) exceed the admission number, priority will be given up to the admission number to children living nearest the school.

Please note:

- The definition of a 'looked after child' in England is a person under the age of 18 who is provided with accommodation by a local authority, acting in its social services capacity, for a continuous period of more than 24 hours, by agreement with the parents or in accordance with section 22 of the Children Act 1989.
- Previously Looked After refers to those children who immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption order, (under section 46 of the Adoption and Children Act 2002), Child Care Arrangement Order (under Section 8 of the Children Act 1989), or specialist guardianship order (under Section 14A of the Children Act 1989).
- Children looked after under an agreed series of short term placements (respite care) are excluded.
- If a request for admission to school is made under the previously looked after (PLAC) criteria, an online supplementary information form (SIF) will need to be completed on the Kirklees Pupil Admissions website.
- If you are making an application under the priority for a previously looked after child, you will need to complete a Previously looked after child (PLAC) SIF available online under Section 7 Guidelines for applying. This should be submitted, with a copy of the court order, so the Local Authority can verify this priority.

- A child is regarded as having been in 'state care outside of England' if they were in the care of or were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society. Evidence must be provided by parents of the child's adoption from state care outside England.
- Children in priority 1 above may be admitted above the PAN.
- The definition of an 'older brother or sister attending' means a sibling, half sibling, foster sibling or adopted sibling who is currently in Years 3-6 (inclusive) or adopted sibling who will be living with them at the same address at the date of their entry to the academy, at the time of admission. Please note that cousins do not count as siblings.
- 'Live' means the child's permanent home at the date when applications close or, if a significant house move is involved, the latest reasonable date before the final allocation of places.
- Where a child's parents live at different addresses and the child spends time at each address we will consider the following when deciding on the address that will be used for admissions purposes:
 - the amount of time spent at each address
 - which parent has parental responsibility for the child
 - who receives child benefit for the child
 - where the child is registered for medical and dental care
 - any residency or custody orders made by the courts.

We will ask for documentary evidence to support information given about the above points.

Distance is measured in a straight line from a child's home address to the school. Measurements are calculated using six-figure National Grid Co-ordinates taken from the National Land and Property Gazetteer. This grid reference refers to a point that falls within the permanent building structure corresponding to the address. The boundary of the building structure for the address is from Ordnance Survey's MasterMap. For smaller, residential properties the grid reference marks a point near the centre of the building. For larger properties, like schools with, for example, multiple buildings and large grounds, the grid reference relates to a point inside the main addressable building structure. The distance calculated is accurate to within 1 metre.

Flats

In the event of two or more children living equidistant from the school, eg, blocks of flats, the place will be decided by drawing lots, the first name drawn out of the bag will be offered the place.

Notification of Offer of Place

The application period will run from the week beginning 1 September 2023. The closing date for applications will be 15 January 2024. The formal offer of a place will come from the Local Authority which will write to Parents/Carers in April 2024 allocating a single place to their child.

Waiting List/Appeals

The Governing Body will use the oversubscription criteria above to rank unsuccessful applicants in a waiting list so that further places may be offered by the Local Authority if they become available. The waiting list will close at the final day of the term in which the application was made.

Unsuccessful applicants may also contact the Academy to be advised of their right of appeal to an Independent Appeal Panel.

IN-YEAR ADMISSIONS

All applications for an in-year admission to The MJS must be made on the Kirklees In-year Common Application Form (ICAF) available from the Academy. This form is available on the Kirklees Council Website: <http://www.kirklees.gov.uk/beta/admissions/pdf/in-year-admissions.pdf>. together with a booklet explaining the process.

The completed form is then sent directly to Marsden Junior School

Children of UK Service Personnel and Crown Servants

Kirklees Council is signed up to the armed forces Community Covenant, which is a pledge made by the government to ensure that the armed forces and their families are not disadvantaged as a result of their service. As part of the coordinated process, applications from armed forces families are reviewed on an individual basis to ensure they are not disadvantaged and, Kirklees LA may ask schools to consider admission over PAN if this is felt to be necessary. Children of UK service personnel and crown servants returning from overseas to live within Kirklees, will be allocated a school place in advance of their arrival (as long as one is available) provided that the application is accompanied by an official letter that declares a relocation date. The address at which the child will live will be used when applying oversubscription criteria, as long as the parents provide some evidence of their intended address. A Unit or quartering address will be used as the child's home address when considering the application against oversubscription criteria, where a parent requests this.

Fair Access Protocol

We participate in Kirklees' Fair Access Protocol. This helps ensure that all children, including those who are unplaced and vulnerable, or having difficulty in securing a school place in-year, get access to a school place as quickly as possible.

Admission of children outside normal age group

It is the general view of the academy that all children and young people will complete their primary in school year groups according to their normal age group. Applications should still be made with an accompanying letter should a request be made to be admitted outside of the normal age group. This request will be considered by the admissions authority.
